

Mimi Kunz

OUR MOTHER TONGUE



Mimi Kunz is a visual artist and poet. A Buddhist monk once told her to 'put the mind in the body' — advice which has shaped her life and art. Curious about the body as a language, she observes its universal expressions and personal characteristics, pointing out the unconscious gestures through which we read each other's bodies.

Mimi studied Painting and Graphics at the Staatliche Akademie der Bildenden Künste Karlsruhe, Germany. Her work has been shaped by residencies in Europe (Moving Landscapes, Italy, 2024 / Le fil des Mots, Belgium 2022 / Symbiose, Belgium, 2019 / Common Grounds, UK, 2017) and Vietnam (Time & Realities, 2021 / Live.Make.Share, 2018), and supported by the Goethe Institut Hanoi and the European Union. Her artwork has been exhibited internationally (Maison d'Art Actuel des Chartreux, Brussels / Casa del Arte, Concepción, Chile / Nature Art Biennale, South Korea), and can be found in private collections across all continents. Her poetry has been shortlisted for the Bridport and nominated for a Pushcart Prize.

















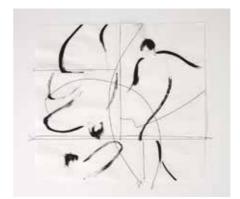


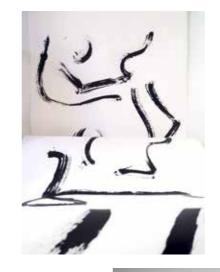

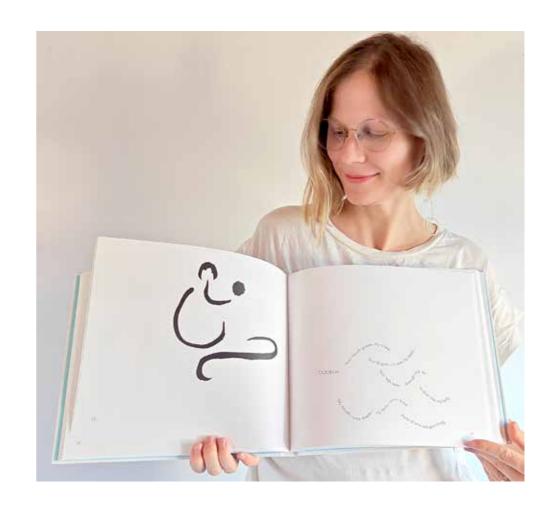

Mother Tongue

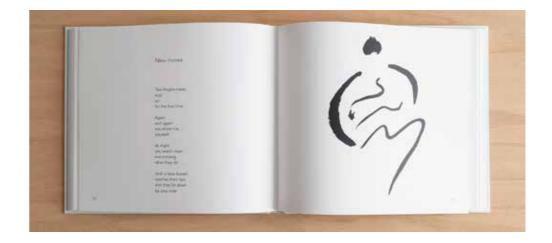
A book of poetry and painting published by The Kyoudai Press, 2024

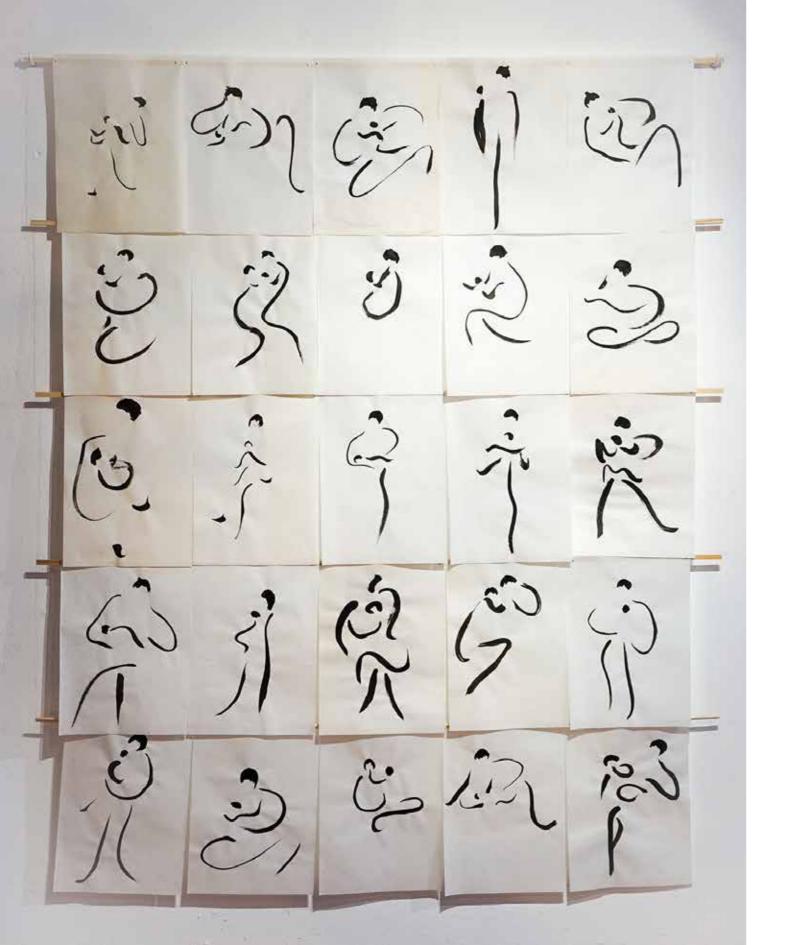

During her artist residency in Pennabilli Mimi Kunz was invited to meet the nuns of the Augustinian monastery. Drawn to meditation and curious about the connections between the mind and the body, the artist wanted to see if a spiritual mindset can be shown by portraying the body.

When painting the nuns her brushstrokes went inward, towards the core of the portrayed persons, reflecting their intentional movements and the mindful interactions she had observed at the monastery.

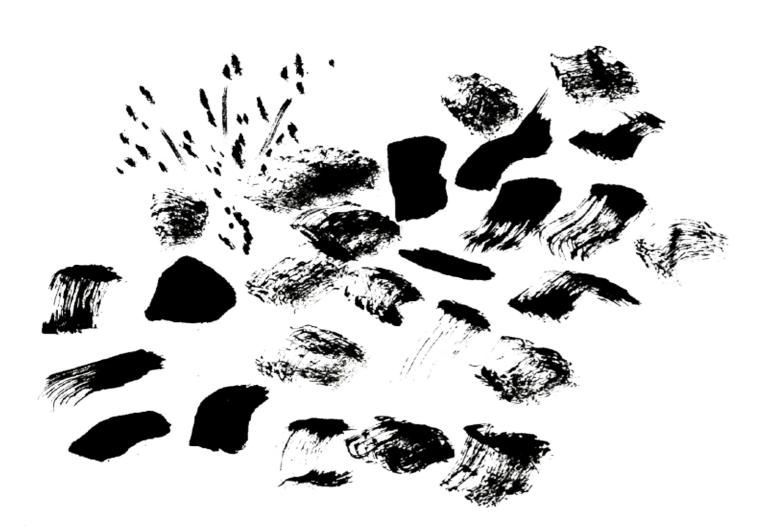

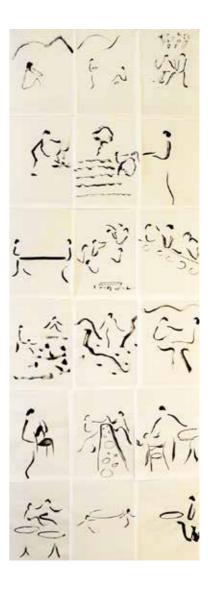

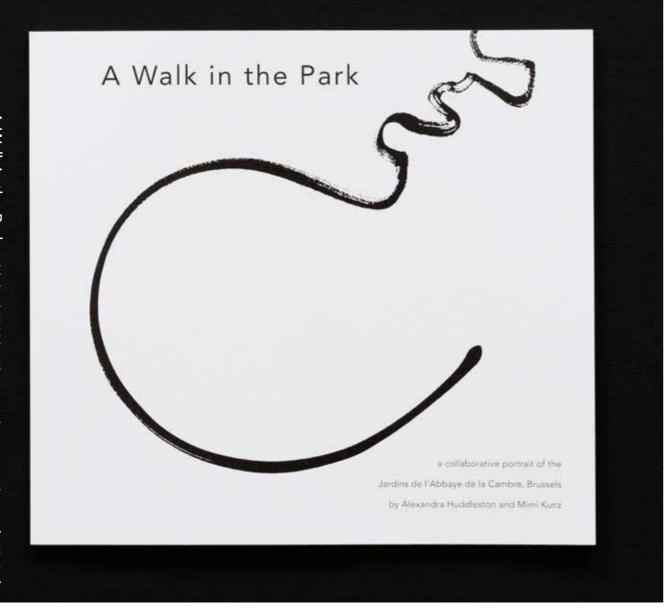






Physicality

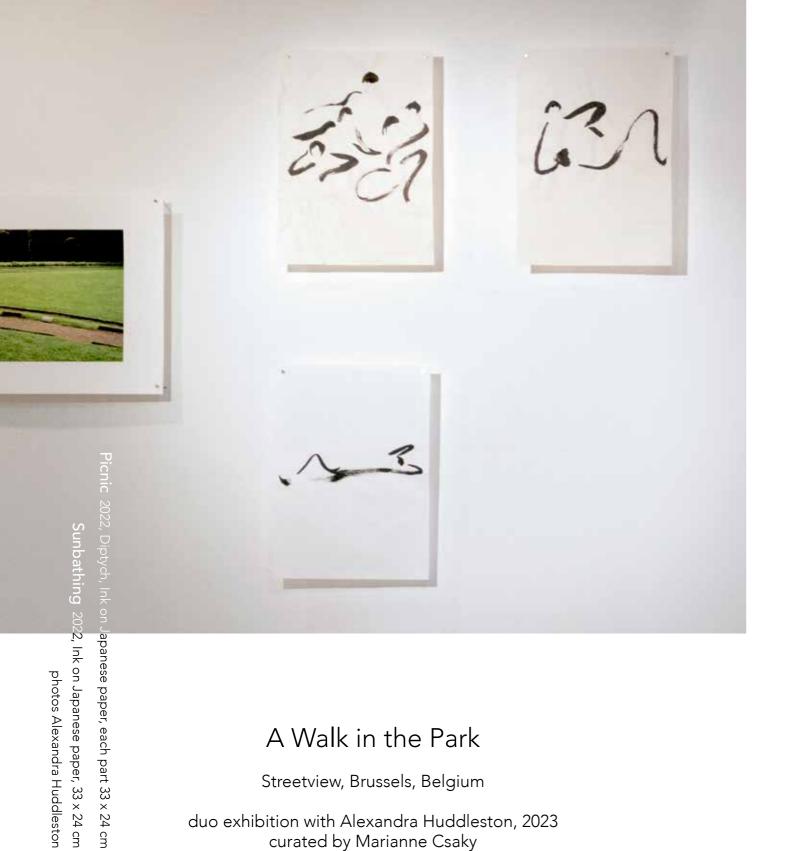
A Walk in the Park

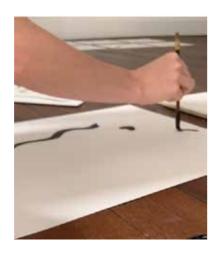

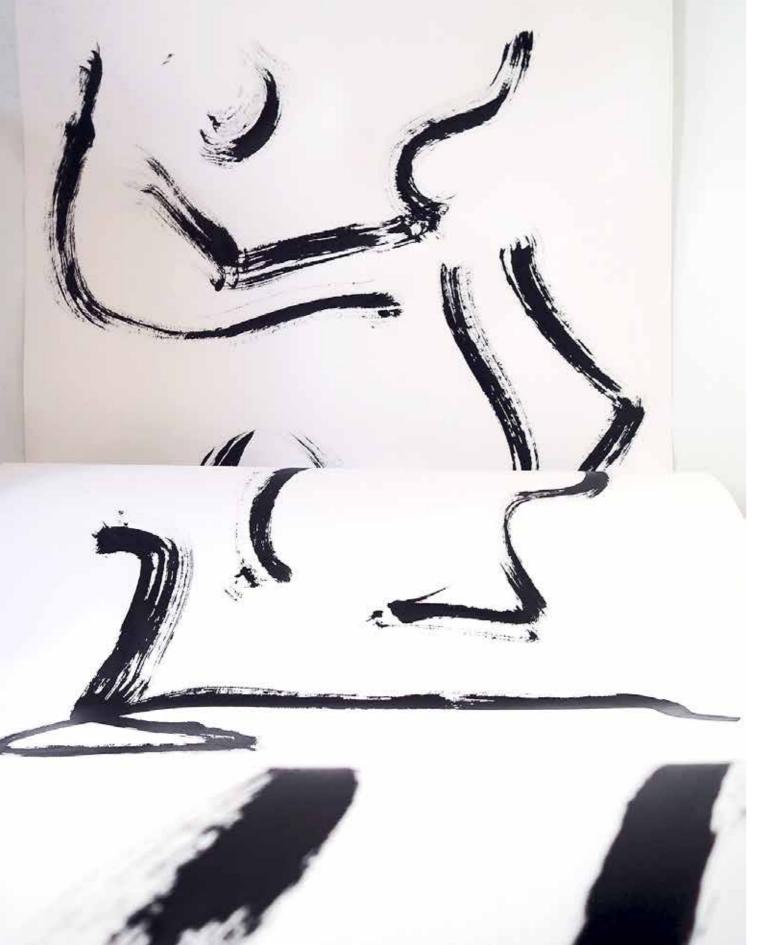

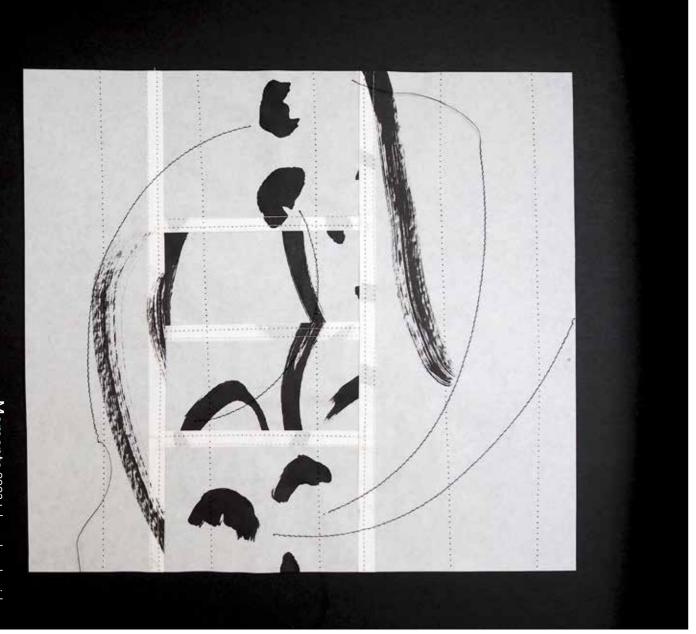

- the form of things, the shape of us

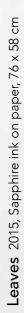

Aren't we like leaves on a tree?
Can a shape say 'Happy'?
In her most abstract series Mimi Kunz explores movement as a universal language. The sapphire blue ink paintings are made with calligraphy brushes on paper. In 2015 the artist abstracted four shapes from leaves dancing on a tree. These shapes have since become an alphabet. Like arms and legs of a body they can express states of being and nuance their expresssion through compositions just like the human body.

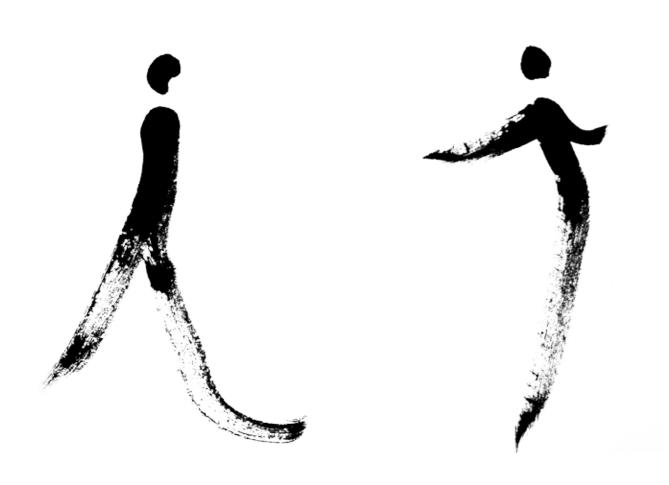


Shapes of a Day
